History of e164.arpa



- ENUM maps the E.164 phone numbers into DNS
 - RFC 2916 (Sep. 2000), 3761 (Apr. 2004), 6116 (Mar. 2011)
- RIPE NCC is operating the global e164.arpa zone
 - Under instructions from the Internet Architecture Board (IAB)
 - In close coordination with the ITU Telecommunications Standardisation Bureau (TSB)
 - The instructions had been last revised in 2004
- RIPE ENUM Working Group
 - June 2004 November 2013, merged with the DNS WG per RIPE 66

Current Status



- "Public" ENUM in e164.arpa
 - 57 delegations based on E.164 country codes and global services
 - Not much observed usage, probably legacy experiments still around
 - Recent activity includes redelegation of 1.3.e164.arpa (NL)

"Private" ENUM

- Not visible in the public DNS
- Very popular amongst mobile network operators
- Impossible to provide usage statistics

The Problem



- Over time, many of the public delegations have deteriorated
- Based on the current 57 registered domains:
 - 1 temporary delegation expired, but is still working
 - 2 delegations never completed the technical setup
 - 4 delegations were deleted from the RIPE Database by assignee
 - 16 delegations experienced technical issues, e.g. lame delegations
 - Many tech-c and admin-c point to stale objects and contact data

The Solution



- Approached IAB in July 2018
 - Shared our concerns regarding data quality
 - Identified a number of issues with the instructions
 - Raised the lack of instructions for deletions and maintenance
- A new set of instructions got drafted
 - Added the procedure for deletions
 - Allowing the RIPE NCC to check registrations pro-actively
- Coordinated changes with ITU-T Study Group 2
 - All changes, including deletions, need to be approved by the government

Cleaning Up



- The new instructions have been signed off by all parties
 - Published on http://www.ripe.net/enum on 2 May 2018
 - ITU-T Study Group 2 have updated their interim instructions to TSB
- We will start looking into all the faults
 - Try and resolve any technical issues and update contacts
 - When necessary: advise the government to delete a stale delegation
- Please help us
 - Find the current contacts and establish the chain of custody
